

Biology—Grade 13 (C)

Course No.: BI55

Biology examines nature of life at cellular level. Cell structures and functions are examined. Techniques of cell study is taken up. Biochemistry, major metabolic pathways, respiration, photosynthesis, protein synthesis, and cell membrane functions are studied. Cell division covers mitosis, meiosis, leads to study of gene action, genetics, latest on gene engineering and ethics. Labs will be done in all phases of study.

Periodic law investigated, along with selected families from the periodic table.

Initially basic concepts are reviewed: atomic structure; nomenclature; the mole concept; gas laws; laws of chemical combinations; periodic law. Chemical relations are studied with respect to enthapy and entropy changes, rate of reaction, reversibility and equilibrium. Equilibria studies are precipitation reactions, acid-base theories and reaction and redox

Italian—Grade 11 (C)

Course No.: IT35

The Year 3 course basically continues the work in Year 2. That is, it provides the essentials for understanding, speaking, reading and writing the language at an elementary to inter-mediate level. At the same time, it seeks to deepen the student's insight into Italian life, customs, and mental attitudes. The emphasis of the program is still placed on aural-oral components. The course is taught in Italian and uses structural drills, oral exercises, spontaneous dialogues, oral presentations, group projects and debates to further the student's cultural knowledge. This knowledge of Italy and Italians is broadened by the various stories, poems, historical data, songs, pictures, and other cultural material both contained in, and suggested by the prescribed texts.

In this course students will simplify, evaluate and factor algebraic expressions, add, subtract, multiply, divide with second order radicals, determine equations of straight lines, algebraic solutions of a pair of linear equations, graphical solution of interaction and union of linear equations and inequations. In geometry basic constructions, congruence, Isoceles triangle and parallel lines, theorems and related deductions will be studied.

YORK BOARD OF EDUCATION SECONDARY SCHOOL CREDIT COURSES

Diplomas

The following diplomas are granted after successful completion of the requisite number of credits as specified by the Ministry of Education.

1. Ontario Secondary School Graduation Diploma

This diploma requires the successful completion of 27 credits. At least three credits must be in each of the four areas of study: Arts, Communication, Pure and Applied Sciences and Social and Environmental Studies. For other detailed requirements, the guidance counsellor or the principal at York Memorial NLC should be consulted.

2. Equivalent Standing for Mature Students

An important step has been taken by the Ministry of Education in helping mature students to proceed more quickly towards a Secondary School Graduation Diploma. Credits may now be

- certain courses not normally identified as being part of the secondary education - all or part of authorized apprenticeship programs
- experience formally acquired in the adult world that can be equated as equivalent to that which

A mature student must be at least 18 years of age and must have been out of school for at least one year. Interested adults should seek the assistance of a school counsellor or contact Continuing Education — 653-2270.

Each case is considered individually and prospective candidates must provide transcripts from former day or night schools, letters from employers and other sources which may support requests for equivalency and mature credits.

Day School Students

Day school students registering for Credit courses must submit a recommendation from their day school principal when registering. Evidence of parental approval is necessary if under the age of 18.

Career Counselling

Career counselling will be available to all students during registration and for as many weeks after as required.
