The Ontario Provincial Election is being held September 18, 1975. To be eligible to vote, you have to be eighteen years of age, a Canadian citizen or a British subject and have resided in Ontario for the past twelve months. To aid you in making your decision for either the Conservatives, the Liberals or the New Democratic Party we have interviewed the candidates for the three ridings surrounding Humber College, that is, York West, Etobiccke and Humber.

Hopefully, the brief summaries of the candidates running for office will assist you in making an intelligent decision.

ETOBICOKE

CHIEF RETURNING OFFICER NO.

NEW DEMOCRATIC PARTY
ED PHILIP NO. 745-6411
AGE 35

Mr. Philip is presently in charge of leadership training for the Ontario Federation of Agriculture, a position he has held for about two years. Prior to this he was National Program Director of Mental Health Canada. He has had a number of years experience as a Management Training Consultant, and five years experience working with youth in the slums of Montreal. Mr. Philip holds a B.A. and M.Ed. from the University of Ottawa. He has completed the course work for a PHD in Adult Education at



the University of Toronto. His wife, Suzanne is in the Department of Nursing at Humber, Osler Campus. This is the first time Mr. Philip is running in an

On the topic of community colleges, Mr. Philip feels that there is an instability which is caused by financing. Programs are being planned without knowing where the money is coming from and on top of that, programs are being changed too often. He states that Colleges do not serve the community. Technology programs should be run by industry. Courses should be taught by letting the students work and learn at the same time. This system he says would not only take care of the program of students being taught the advanced methods that are not being used but would also have expenditures down tremendously.

There is no plan for Housing in Ontario. He says we need to develop north of the agricultural belt and that the province should have a land bank.

Mr. Philip is very concerned with the insensitivity of the Government of Ontario. He has lived in Saskatchewan and he says that there exists a government that is responsive — look at the results. He is concerned that farm land is disappearing and this is one of the reasons why food prices are going up. What should be done about rsing prices? Ed Philip believes that the Ontario Government should establish a price review board with powers to roll back unwarranted price increases.

Mr. Lewis, he states, is a very sensitive and human person. A man who is concerned, not only concerned about the negative matters but also the positive.

LIBERAL LEONARD BRAITHWAITE NO. 742-1967

Mr. Braithwaite attended Harbord Collegiate Institute in Toronto. In 1950, he obtained his Bachelor of Commerce at the University of Toronto. In 1952, he got his Masters degree in Business Administration at Harvard University in Boston. He also is a graduate of Osgoode Hall Law School in Toronto. He was first elected to the Ontario Legislature at the General Election of September, in 1963. He was re-elected in 1967 and 1971.



During the 29th Session of the Legislature, Mr. Braithwaite introduced seven Private Members Bills. An example of these bills is the Landlord and Tenant Amendment Act. This bill provides for effective Rental Review Boards which would determine the amounts of rental increases. Mr. Braithwaite will continue to push for an effective housing program so that the average person might be able to buy his own home. To aid those who rent, he will keep pressing for Rental Review Boards in all large municipalities. He considers the existing density of population in North-West Metro to be much too high and will keep urging the Province not to locate or approve any additional high-rise or income-assisted housing in the area for the present.

Over a five year period, Braithwaite would like to see the Provincial Government assume 80% of the average cost of education, thus relieving the municipal taxpayer of an excessive tax burden. Government re-organization would help to reduce taxes by simplifying and vastly reducing the cost of government.

He continually keeps in touch with residents in the riding by mailing a questionnaire to each person at least once every year.

Mr. Braithwaite favours the new airport and will continue his fight for province wide noise control regulations to minimize noise and air pollution from Malton Airport and from local industry.

CONSERVATIVE

Bill Stockwell is not a new face to the Etobicoke political scene. A member of the Etobicoke and Metropolitan Toronto Planning Boards since 1967 as well as a member of Etobicoke Council and Metropolitan Toronto Council makes him well aware of the problems and concerns of the people of the Etobicoke Riding.

"The biggest problem that this riding has," he says "is that it's been represented in the Ontario Legislature for the past twelve years by a member of the Opposition. No matter what political leanings you have, you must admit that the next Ontario government will be a Conservative government headed up by Bill Davis. If Etobicoke is to have a strong voice in that government, to speak on behalf of the people of the riding, that voice must be part of the government caucus. That way, things get done."

Throughout his political career Bill has been a proponent of proper land use planning for Etobicoke. He has been an outspoken critic of the "jamming in" of high density apartments without proper consideration going to the social and recreational services that must be provided for neighbourhoods. "The poor planning that has gone into the Ontario Housing Corporation Developments has virtually destroyed neighbourhoods in Northern Etobicoke, by building subsidized housing and then leaving the tenants of

such' housing and the surrounding communities to work out their own problems. This must stop." He goes on to say, "build no more subsidized housing in this riding and furthermore, O.H.C., the Borough of Etobicoke and Metro must sit down to work out the problems of the people that are already here." Bill is critical of the Liberal member for Etobicoke for not "speaking up for the community in connection with the O.H.C. problems.

Bill Stockwell is 41 years old, married, the father of five children ranging in age from 1é to 20 and he is the president of Appollo Insurance Agencies of Etobicoke. He speaks well of the Conservative record in Ontario regarding education. "It's easy to be critical of education and the amount of money that is being spent on education," he says "but what better investment do we have than seeing that our youngsters get a sound education before going out into the business world. The government has been criticized about its so-called "cut-backs" on the education dollar but in Metro Toronto \$573,973,000.00 in grants were given to University of Toronto, York, and Ryerson. The five community colleges in Metro, Centennial, Humber, Senaca, Sheridan and George Brown have been funded to the tune of \$75,237,000.00 in 74-75 and the student placement record is over 93% and that's not bad."

Bill hopes to represent the riding of Etobicoke as its M.P.P. after September 18 and invites all residents of the riding to join him in his campaign to "Give Etobicoke a Voice in Government."

His campaign workers have borrowed the slogan of the Toronto Argonauts; "we're Gonna Win."

YORK WEST CHIEF RETURNING OFFICER NO. 239-7361



LIBERAL JOE CRUDEN NO. 231-2287 AGE 48

Mr. Cruden was born in Toronto and has been an Etobicoke resident for twenty-two years. He is presently employed as Audio-Visual Productions Manager with Bell Canada. In 1969, he was the Vice-Chairman on the Etobicoke Board of Education. He served as a campaign manager for the late R. Winters. He is a former President of the Toronto and District Liberal ssociation, and is the current Past President of the Liberal Party in Ontario.

His major concern is education. He says there has been a 333% rise in cost and the result of this are children

who can't read or write at college age. Mr. Nixon will reinstate a core curriculum where all children will be required to learn basic subjects.


He states that 32 years of Tory Control in Ontario has left the province in financial, educational and social disarray and the Liberal Party offers the only alternative with the fresh and honest approaches that Mr. Nixon has been outlining across the province.

The Rent Review Board is another of his concerns. He feels that the present one is doing nothing and one should be established that has some meaning — one with teeth. It needs to be toughened.

CONSERVATIVE NICK LELUK NO. 239-4378 AGE 40





On being asked how he feels about his party leader, he says that Mr. Davis' record will speak for itself whereas Mr. Nixon is conducting a very negative campaign.



CONSERVATIVE JOHN MACBETH NO. 233-6293 AGE 53



Mr. MacBeth has been the Minister of Labour since May 31, 1974 and has been a member of the Legislature for York West for the past three years. Prior to his appointment as Minister of Labour, he presided over two select Committees - Chairman of the Committee reviewing the work of the Ontario Municipal Board and the Chairman of the Committee on the Ontario Hydro's new Headquarters Building. He has also spent several years of public and municipal service. He has served twenty-three years in politics. He has been in this field because he enjoys it and likes to serve people. He has a good success on the problems presented to him, has always encouraged people to come to his home or office. He is always readily accessible."

On Housing, he feels that there is a problem in the province and the best way to handle it is free enterprise. There is a need for more public and senior citizen housing. He notes though, that Ontario is comfortably housed compared to other provinces.

On Transportation he states that we are being better serviced and he was partly instrumental in obtaining the GO train. He says the government can only afford so much and that they are working in priority.

Being Minister of Labour his main goal is industrial peace and although Ontario has had a fair share of strikes there is a good history of industrial harmony.

Mr. MacBeth feels that these are tough days to be government. No matter what the leaders bring out there will always be opposition from somewhere. He says people judge things on how they affect themselves and though the adverse group may be quite small in percentage terms, the people who benefit take it as their right and therefore we only hear the negative points.

He feels that Mr. Davis is a very strong leader and good listener. His performance has been good. He feels Davis has done a good job on education and it was while he was in power that we got the community colleges.

HUMBER LIBERAL ALEX MARCHETTI NO. 239-7358

Mr. Marchetti is a naturalized CANADIAN OF Italian birth, and has been a resident of Etobicoke for seventeen years. He has a Doctor of Science from the University of Rome and a Professional Egineer (Ontario). He has



taught civil engineering since 1964 at Ryerson, where he has been a member of the faculty Association and an elected member of the Academic Council for the past nine years.

He has been an alderman for ten years in Ward 2 and is constantly in touch with people of the community. He is running in this election because he feels he can give more active representation towards the needs of Humber riding.

Mr. Marchetti is disturbed by the quality of education that we are receiving. As a professor at Ryerson, he sees the poor standards and realizes the need for another approach to education. To reduce expenses, he feels slic-

ing should start from the top not from the students. He feels that there are a number of people being paid enormous salaries in our education system that are doing nothing.

On Rental Review Board, he says that it is useless. He wants to have a review board that has the power to deal with the rates that exist.

The Housing problem, he feels exists because of the amount of time it takes to develop the land. All of the red tape should be cut out. The govern-

ment should allow the developer to receive services more quickly, e.g. water. At the moment, the developer has to hold a lot for five years, the cost of this carrying of the land is passed on to the buyer. This results in higher prices.


Mr. Marchetti states that the Davis government has no answers to the transportation problem. Mr. Davis has not embodied the full integrity he wishes the people of Ontario to believe. Marchetti feels that Davis is fooling around with people. In 1971, Davis stopped Spadina, and in 1975, he changed his mind — integrity?

Mr. Nixon, he says is a better leader because he is a capable, efficient and experienced man. He can handle a party and can take complete charge of the province.
